Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Background

- BIL also referred to as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) passed 11/15/2021
- BIL provides funding for drinking water and wastewater infrastructure through <u>existing</u> EPA funded programs [unlike ARPA].
- Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) –
 Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and Business Oregon
- DWSRF Loan Fund = Safe Drinking Water Revolving Loan Fund (SDWRLF)
- 5 years of enhanced DWSRF funding in addition to that typically received; three distinct funding buckets

SDWRLF Program Characteristics

- Eligible Entities: Public Water Systems (over 15 connections); publicly or privately owned.
- Eligible activities: Drinking water infrastructure. Projects prioritized (ranked) by OHA.
- Disadvantages: Federal requirements, less than nimble application process
- Advantages: Low interest rates (80% of 20-bond index down to 1%); Forgivable Loan (subsidy)



DWSRF/SDWRLF Subsidy

- Subsidy = Forgivable Loan (Similar to grant)
- ■EPA Requires set amounts (including for "Disadvantaged Communities")
- Definition of Disadvantaged Community established by the state.



Disadvantaged Community Definition

- SDWA section 1452(d)
- (3) DEFINITION OF DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITY.—In this subsection, the term "disadvantaged community" means the service area of a public water system that meets affordability criteria established after public review and comment by the State in which the public water system is located.



Oregon DWSRF Disadvantaged Community Considerations

- A water system with a service area that has a median household income (MHI) below the state average.
- Affordability Criteria: Business Oregon analyzes the monthly water rate at project completion and compares it to the affordability rate (MHI * 1.25% / 12 months).
- To ensure consistency Oregon DWSRF uses an Equivalent Dwelling Unit or a standard unit of water demand equal to one single family residence which consumes 7,500 gallons of water.
- Potential for definition refinement (in coordination with OHA)

BIL Next Steps for Business Oregon

- Determine timing for application (OHA to apply)
- Manage initial expectations and build project pipeline for future grant years
- Adapt program to new federal requirements and guidance
- Help communities plan and identify projects

- Submit SDWRLF Letter of Interest (LOI)
- If lead or PFAS issues exist, contact OHA or submit an LOI
- Contact a Business Oregon Regional Development Officer
- Plan now for future funding years
