Why I joined the Women's Caucus:

To meet, learn from, and share with the elected and appointed women leading Oregon's cities. We have a lot to offer our cities and each other.

Quite a few women, all having been elected to a position in city government, participated in the formation of the Women's Caucus of the League of Oregon Cities. In this issue Catherine Biscoe, one of the formation leaders and the 1st Women's Caucus President, provides an enlightening summary of the beginnings and first year. As I took on the role of President, two thoughts came to mind: *The only constant in life is change.*

The more things change, the more they stay the same.

This has borne out in the work the Board and Executive Committee are doing to refine the structure and workings of the Caucus. While any woman elected/appointed to office in a city member of LOC is automatically 'qualified' to be a member of the Women's Caucus, organizationally we need to know who we serve. That is done via 'declaring' membership.

- * The format and process for membership is an important accomplishment during this first quarter of 2023.
- The QR code on the front of this newsletter leads to the membership declaration.
- * Declaring membership provides the very important ability to have a say in what the Caucus does through voting and participating in committees and the Board.
- * Declaring membership also assures receiving all notices of Women's Caucus meetings and events.

I joined and have worked to establish the Women's Caucus because I could see 'what's in it for me': a support system in which I could learn and refine my skills as a woman elected to city government; a network with others having the same experiences and sharing many of the same lens which color or interpret those experiences; a group of women fostering friendship and understanding of the female experience in government; an opportunity to have discussions and learn with the overlay of woman's philosophy.

I believe one of the basic desires we all share is to make a difference – for others; in our community; in this world. The work we have all undertaken certainly provides one path to fulfilling that need. BRAVO to all of you who have taken this leap.

Well behaved women seldom make history.

The Women's Caucus – First in the League's 98-year history

"A survey of Oregon cities in 2019 showed that women made up about 43% of all elected officials then in office. In 2021, only 71 Oregon cities had a woman mayor (29%)."

In 2017, after 92 years, the League of Oregon Cities realized the boardroom no longer represented the diversity of Oregon cities. A meaningful effort was made to revise the LOC Strategic Plan to create a platform of diversity in leadership, including increasing women's participation.

In early 2021, the League reached out to local officials to seeking interest in the formation of a Women's Caucus...one hundred twenty-three women elected officials responded to the call and in June, the Women's Caucus was officially recognized by the LOC Board of Directors.

In its first year, the Women's Caucus formed essential committees, revised the bylaws, created a logo, developed conference literature, expanded outreach, and identified priorities for the Caucus including homelessness, improving council relationships, developing leaders, mentorship, and increasing diversity, equity, and inclusion. The Caucus successfully held three virtual W.E. Talk coffee hours (Women Elected), featuring the special events, "Meet the Mayors" and "Welcome to Election Season."

The LOC 2022 Fall Conference gave us time to celebrate in-person these accomplishments, and the Women's Caucus hosted a social hour celebrated by our own members as well as our colleagues from the People of Color caucus and other officials from across the state.

The potential of the Women's Caucus is just beginning to be realized. We recognize that public policy and local government impacts us all, and it is important that our elected officials have the resources needed to make good decisions. Lifting the voices of women leaders across Oregon has endless possibilities. Empowering current and emerging local government officials delivers value to every city, every county, and every region in the state. It is that pursuit of excellence in public service and local government leadership that we collectively embrace.
